

quotes from my superwhisper history

i love superwhisper. i never really learned to type properly, so it saves me quite a bit of time. i have used it since may, but i deleted that recording history by accident, so mine starts in june: 5,358 recordings, 191,971 words, twenty-one hours of me talking. that is about 150 words a minute. typing it at the thirty words a minute i actually manage would have taken 107 hours, so call it three and a half days back.
